Benjamin Lachapelle | Autistic Artist, Author & Illustrator

Benjamin Lachapelle has been selected as the artist whose work will be presented to the recipient of the 2nd Annual Jim and Ginette Munson Autism Leadership Award. The Award Ceremony announcing the recipient of the 2nd Annual Jim and Ginette Munson Leadership Award will take place Wednesday April 19th, 2023 from 2:30 - 3:00 PM.

Benjamin Lachapelle (self described “Animal Knower”) is a 20-year-old Canadian Autistic artist and author-illustrator of children’s books from Quebec. Diagnosed with autism at age 3, he is a multidisciplinary artist with a singular focus on animals, his passion since he was a young child. Ben uses art to manage his feelings and express himself. He channels his joys and his anxieties for animals through his paintings, sculptures, stories, and illustrations. His work has been exhibited in numerous events and commissioned by organizations, businesses, and private collectors throughout North America. Extinction Protest Series (EPS) is a collection of paintings Ben began in 2019 upon hearing a United Nations report that 1 million species were threatened with extinction because of habitat destruction and climate change. Each painting is a manifestation of Ben’s intense love for animals and his frustrations over the inadequate global response to environmental crises. Going into Year 5, EPS is Ben’s call-to-action for the planet, biodiversity and the animals.

Benjamin has written and illustrated several children’s books including How Tall is a Yeti? and Pace-Ants (a book about patience). Each book provides a unique glimpse into Ben’s rich inner world as an autistic creative. Ben enjoys reading his stories at elementary schools to share his love for animals and promote autism acceptance and inclusion.

Manager, Neurodiverse Initiatives at Azrieli Foundation

Orly Fruchter is the Manager of Neurodiverse Initiatives at the Azrieli Foundation. She has over 12 years of experience working in international development and disaster response. Dr. Heather M. Brown was initially trained as an elementary school teacher but is now an Associate Professor in the Faculty of Education at the University of Alberta. She is also an autistic researcher passionate about supporting the academic achievement and overall well-being of autistic children, youth and adults. Her community-based participatory research aims to empower autistic individuals to be more self-confident in their neurodiversity and better understand the factors that most support their

well-being at home, work and school. She currently serves as the director of the Autism, Neurodiversity and Academic Achievement (AIDAN) Lab as well as the chair of both the Neurodiversity and Autism Research in Education Committee (NAREC) for the American Educational Research Association (AERA) and the Autistic Researcher Committee (ARC) for the Autism Intervention Research Network on Physical Health (AIR-P) at UCLA.

Through the principles of Universal Design for Learning, I help students to better understand their personal learning preferences and sensory experiences. This awareness can then be utilized to empower students to build supports, strategies, and resources to help improve their academic, social, and personal wellbeing.



Dr. Lee Burdette Williams | Presenter
Executive Director, College Autism Network

Lee Burdette Williams is the Executive Director of the College Autism Network, an organization committed to improving access, experiences and outcomes for college students on the autism spectrum. She worked in higher education and student affairs for almost three decades, including serving as Vice President for Student Affairs and Dean of Students at Wheaton College (MA) and Dean of Students at the University of Connecticut. As a student affairs professional, Lee served in a variety of areas including student activities, residential life, orientation, student conduct, and admissions. She has taught in student affairs graduate programs at the University of Vermont, the University of Connecticut, Appalachian State University, Western Michigan University, and the University of Maryland.

Lee holds a Ph.D. in College Student Personnel Administration from the University of Maryland College Park and an M.Ed. in community counseling from Salem State University. Her undergraduate degree is from Gordon College (MA). Lee is a frequent contributor to Inside Higher Ed and the Chronicle of Higher Education, and is the author of two professional books, one on peer education and one on learning communities. Associate Professor of Disability Studies & Inclusive Education at Brandon University

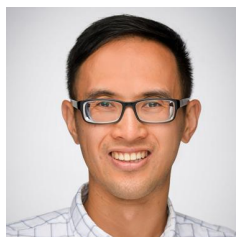

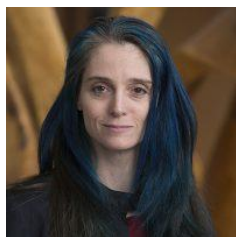
Dr. Jonathan Lai | Presenter

Rebekah Kintzinger | Presenter

Co-Chair of Autism Alliance of Canada's Board of Directors, Autistic Advocate

Rebekah Kintzinger, diagnosed Autistic in 2012, is a prominent Autistic advocate from Kelowna, British Columbia (BC), Canada. Since her diagnosis, her advocacy has included writing extensively about autism in the context of health, language, and policy, which has led her to be featured in a multitude of mediums including magazines, news articles, webinars, and the radio. Rebekah is the co-chair of the board at the Autism Alliance of Canada. Her speaking engagements include participation at a United Nations Conference Side Event on the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD). Her work has also been quoted at the Senate of Canada. She is a founding editor of the Canadian Journal of Autism Equity where she continues to champion the voices of Autistic Canadians and publishing articles in the journal on the models of disability, and education strategies for autistic students. Rebekah also contributed to book chapter about the Hierarchies of Disability Human Rights. Rebekah is very creative. Aside from loving to draw and write, she also appreciates cooking for her two boys, acting out scenes from Monty Python with them and singing karaoke together.



Anna Betty | Presenter

Deputy Grand Chief Achneepineskum, Nishnawbe Aski Nation

Anna Betty Achneepineskum is Anishinaabe-Mushkego from Marten Falls First Nation (Ogoki Post). As Deputy Grand Chief for Nishnawbe Aski Nation, and as a social justice advocate for many years, she has strived and committed to raising awareness of issues and challenges experienced by First Nations people, families, women and children. Anna Betty is a person of action and a strong voice for transformative social change. Her life's work and contributions are driven by a passion to help the most marginalized people, especially the people from the Nishnawbe Aski Nation territory. In whatever she does, she advocates for equitable access to justice and services, and for improving the quality of life, community wellness and safety for all NAN citizens. She currently resides in Thunder Bay, and credits her children, grandchildren and her first great-granddaughter as the inspirations for her lifelong work, service, and advocacy.



The Hon. Mike Lake | Presenter
PC, MP, Edmonton-Wetaskiwin

Mike is the Member of Parliament for Edmonton-Wetaskiwin, and was first elected in 2006. After his re-election in October, 2008, Mike was appointed Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Industry, a position to which he was re-appointed after the May 2011 election.

On September 13, 2012 Mike was sworn into the Queen's Privy Council, after being asked by Prime Minister Stephen Harper to serve on the Priorities and Planning Cabinet Sub-Committee on Government Administration. On October 21, 2019, he was re-elected to a fifth term, receiving the highest vote total out of all candidates, from all parties, across the country. Mike currently serves as the Shadow Minister for Mental Health, Addictions and Suicide Prevention.

Prior to entering federal politics, Mike worked for 10 years with the Edmonton Oilers Hockey Club where he served as National Accounts Manager, Director of Ticket Sales and Group Sales Manager. Mike holds a Bachelor of Commerce (with distinction) from the University of Alberta.

Mike has two children, a son Jaden, 24, and daughter Jenae, 20. The Lakes have been active supporters of autism organizations, families and individuals across the country, and around the world, while sharing their story of life with Jaden, who has autism.

Dr. Deepa Singal | Moderator
Director of Scientific and Data Initiatives at Autism Alliance of Canada

Dr. Singal is a Research Scientist at the Manitoba Centre for Health Policy, a world renowned Centre for population-based research and an Assistant Professor in the Department of Community Health Sciences at the University of Manitoba.

Dr. Singal is a quantitative child and maternal health researcher working at the intersection of academia and policy. As a two-time Health System Impact Fellow at the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) and a CIHR Institute of Health Services and Policy Research (CIHR-IHSPR) Rising Star, Dr. Singal has a breadth of experience working in multiple jurisdictions with senior level policy makers and key change makers in the health data science sector. She has a demonstrated history of leading multidisciplinary teams and her work has informed government policy and has been widely disseminated among media outlets throughout the country.



Dr. Alistair de Gaetano | Presenter

Administrator of the Maltese Government's Directorate for Disability Issues (DDI), and Chairperson of the Autism Advisory Council

Alistair de Gaetano is Administrator of the Maltese Government's Directorate for Disability Issues (DDI), and Chairperson of the Autism Advisory Council. He worked on setting up both the Directorate and the Council, and eventually on developing key legislation, strategies, policy and actions to reform and strengthen the Maltese disability and autism sectors. Alistair has represented Malta at a number of high-level meetings, and was Vice-Chair of the Social Questions Working Party on the European Accessibility Act, during the country's 2017 EU Presidency. He is a warranted lawyer, having studied in Malta, Maastricht and Dublin, where he was awarded a PhD by Trinity College, after defending a dissertation on denial of rights to autistic persons. Alistair was previously involved in disability and autism-related activism and outreach, including as a co-founder of EUCAP, the European Council of Autistic People, and co-chair with IDA (International Disability Alliance) of the working group that delivered the first-ever written submissions on behalf of disabled people to the UN's High-Level Political Forum (HLPF) on Sustainable Development.



Harald Neerland | Presenter

President of Autism Europe

Harald is the father of a young woman with infantile Autism and complex support needs. A professional engineer by education, he has been involved in autism advocacy for 25 years on local, national and international levels; and is the current president of Autism Europe. In addition he has served two periods as president of the Autism Society of Norway, and has been part of several working groups with Norway's Department of Health and Care services focusing on the services for children on the autism spectrum and their families. He has also served as Chairman of the Advisory group, the Autism unit, at Oslo University Hospital. He is focused on educating society, transferring research into practical application, and has organized international conferences, educational programs and most notably a "summer school" for parents of children on the autism spectrum.

The Hon. Wanda Thomas Bernard | Moderator
Canadian Senator

Senator Wanda Thomas Bernard is the first African Nova Scotian woman to be appointed to the Senate of Canada, representing the province of Nova Scotia and her hometown of East Preston. Senator Bernard champions issues impacting African Canadians and people living with disabilities. She is particularly invested in human rights, employment equity, and mental health. Through her involvement in community projects, her social work career, her time with Dalhousie School of Social Work, and now her work in the Senate, Senator Bernard has maintained a deep dedication to social justice and racial justice. Senator Bernard advocates for reparations for the historical and continued anti-Black racism impacting the lives of African Canadians.

Panel Discussion | **Using a Rights-Based Approach to Look at Autism Policies Around the World**



Dr. Jennifer Zwicker | Moderator

Director of Health Policy at the School of Public Policy, University of Calgary, Canada Research Chair in Disability Policy for Children and Youth

Dr. Zwicker is Director of Health Policy at the School of Public Policy, associate professor in the Faculty of Kinesiology, University of Calgary, Canada Research Chair (II) in Disability Policy for Children and Youth and Deputy Scientific Officer for Kids Brain Health Network. Her research program assesses interventions and informs policy around allocation of funding, services, and supports for youth with disabilities and their families. Strong stakeholder and government collaboration has been critical in the translation of peer-reviewed publications to policy papers, op-eds and briefing notes for provincial and federal ministries and senate committees. Her work recently informed the Canadian Academy of Health Sciences National Autism Strategy Working Group and Royal Society of Canada Expert Working Group to develop disability inclusive policy during the COVID-19 pandemic. She has been recognized for her policy leadership as an Action Canada Alumni, Governor General Leadership Forum, and Canada's Top 40 Under 40.

Labour and Employment Lawyer, Forte Workplace Law

Sarah is a labour, employment and human rights lawyer in BC who works with employees, employers and unions and a volunteer with the Autism Alliance of Canada. Research Associate at the University of Calgary – School of Public Policy

Christiane Roth is a Research Associate at the University of Calgary – School of Public Policy. She is currently involved in research on disability policy and child wellbeing measurement to align policy and service delivery with child health and wellbeing. With an MSc in Human Rights from the London School of Economics and Political Science she has particular interest in the domestic application of international disability focused human rights frameworks in Canada.

Christiane has work experience in policy development and advice that aims at improving participation in society and access to services for marginalized population groups. In this framework, she has lead programs on behalf of the German Development Cooperation and European Union Commission, which included efforts to improve access to legal services for people with disabilities.

Christiane is starting her PhD under the supervision of Dr. Jennifer Zwicker to examine how neuro-diversity/disability is considered in policies and service delivery in the justice sector. As an Autism Alliance/KBHN Policy Fellow, Christiane has gained a better understanding of the Canadian policy environment, global approaches to autism specific policy-making and how policies align with international human rights frameworks.

Her research has focused on understanding how prenatal/postnatal experiences shape brain and behavioral development in children. Alongside her research, Preeti has worked as a behavior interventionist with children with developmental disabilities and their caregivers both locally and internationally with the Global Autism Project. She is passionate about family/community engagement in research and knowledge translation with active roles with the Calgary Fetal Alcohol Network, Kids Brain Health Network, and the Calgary Perinatal Collective. Currently, Preeti is a medical student at UCalgary with the long-term career goal to be a clinician-scientist in the field of neurodevelopment.

Sarah is a registered speech-language pathologist and was she was introduced to the world of Autism, 30 years ago, when she attended a Geneva Centre event as part of her student placement. Her work in the field began as a front line provider and has progressed into leadership roles and most

recently to CEO. She also sits as a subject matter expert on the Medical Supplies and Equipment Advisory Committee (MSEAC) with Indigenous Services Canada. She is an ally, an advocate and is dedicated to client centred, needs based work with neurodiverse peoples of all ages. 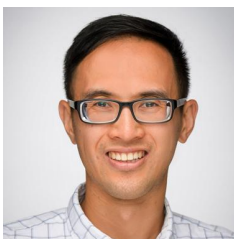

Presentation | Looking Forward at the Alliance



Dr. Jonathan Lai | Presenter Executive Director at Autism Alliance of Canada

Jonathan Lai (PhD) is the Executive Director at Autism Alliance of Canada. He also holds an Adjunct Faculty position in Health Services Research at the Institute of Health Policy, Management and Evaluation (IHPE) in the Dalla Lana School of Public Health at the University of Toronto. Previously, he completed a postdoctoral fellowship at York University, examining predictors of changes in service use for people with developmental disabilities. He led a series of TEDx talks and other integrated knowledge translation projects. Maddy is a former member of the Ontario Autism Program Advisory Panel and Ontario Autism Program Implementation Working Group, and a current member of the Children's Mental Health Ontario ASD Working Group.

Maddy is the founder of Autistic Bridge Inc., and a leader in the National Disability Strategy movement to build a nationwide coalition of disability organizations advocating for a barrier-free Canada that meets all needs of all disabilities at all ages. They are on the Board of Directors of ConnectWell Community Health. They are a member of ECHO Ontario Autism where they are part of the Expert Hub, which works to educate and inform health professionals on issues related to autism.

Maddy has also led workshops, panels and is a featured speaker on topics surrounding Autism, education, gender identity intersections and disability rights. They have spoken at many businesses, organizations and institutions as well as at national and international conferences and the UN Human Rights Commission.
